- Icebreakers (see page 11) can be used to help get the conversations going. For help with Zoom meetings, please contact <u>Sarah Hayden</u>, <u>Women's Director</u>.
- 3. Games (see page 11) can also be played as a group online. You may want to print or download the game sheets ahead of time and forward or mail them to your guests. You could also choose to use virtual gaming platforms like video conference games, Zoom games or Webex games, etc.
- 4. Crafts can be done together via Zoom. Record a video tutorial to show during the gathering, or simpy work through the steps of the project together. Collect and distribute supplies for your guests, or ask them to collect their own. Then connect and create together! See pages 9-10 for fun ideas.
- Use the provided videos and/or devotional (see pages 11-14) to start conversation. These can be read ahead of time or watched/read together.

- 6. An easy way to incorporate beverages into your gathering is to send your guests single-serving packets of hot cocoa or apple cider, or fun holiday-flavored K cups or tea bags. Your guests could then heat and enjoy together!

RECIPES

When hosting an in-home gathering one of the first decisions you will make is whether or not to serve food and beverages. Hostesses can choose between dinner, brunch ideas, small plates or appetizers, just-desserts, or a tea and coffee klatch. You can choose to provide everything or ask your guests to bring a dish-to-pass.

Here are some easy recipe suggestions for you.

BRUNCH: Mini Quiche: serves 6



INGREDIENTS:

- 1 lb. sausage cooked/drained, or ham or bacon
- 8 eggs beaten
- 1/4 c. milk
- 1/2-1 c. shredded cheese
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1 Tbsp. butter
- 1/2 c. red pepper*
- 1 c. mushrooms*
- * or subsitute your favorite veggies

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- 2. Whisk eggs, milk, cheese, salt and pepper.
- 3. Saute' butter, onion and mushrooms.
- 4. Combine all ingredients.
- 5. Foil line or use non-stick cooking spray to coat cupckae pan.
- 6. Bake for 22 minutes or until set.


















Use these questions during craft time, during mealtime, or as guests arrive.

Discussion Questions

- I. What do you think of when you think of the word "home"? Has it changed this year?
- 2. Of the three scripture verses mentioned, which one is most meaningful to you and why?
- 3. After watching the video message from Sarah, how can we think of Jesus as our home?
- 4. In the video, Sarah challenged us to consider putting our faith and trust in God as our shelter and refuge (Psalm 91:1-2) so that our expectations for our earthly homes are good and right, instead of looking to earthly "substitutes." What would be some examples of "earthly substitutes" we can be tempted to make as "false refuge?" How do we rely more on God for our refuge than these earthly things?
- 5. Another suggestion Sarah made for us was to practice "homemaking" with others. She described this as inviting others into our lives instead of just focusing on the outward things. What might this look like? What are some ways we can be intentional in this endeavor?



CHRIST AT HOME FOR CHRISTMAS DEVOTIONAL

John 1:14 "So the word became human and made His home among us." (NLT)

We hear this verse every year at Christmastime. It is familiar. These are the same words we hear annually at church, on Christmas cards, in Christmas carols, etc. This is what Christmas is about—the guiding star, the vulnerable virgin Mary expecting a child, the young carpenter taking his betrothed to his hometown for the census, the helpless yet holy Christ child born into the world in a dirty stable, the lowly shepherds hearing the news, the heavenly host of angels announcing His arrival. The invisible God taking form as a human baby, subject to human limitations. It's a story of nostalgia, it's a story that evokes imagination, it's a story passed down through the ages. And yet in the year 2020, this story can feel irrelevant, intangible, distant, and simply put: historical. The story of Christmas can, over the years, be reduced to a "tradition," a Christmas pageant, a play, or a picture book we read to children.

When you think of the story of Christmas, what comes to mind? Do you recall an experience where the story of Christmas was made impactful or more "real" to you?

John I says that "the Word" (Jesus) was with God in the beginning. In Genesis, God's spirit "hovered" over the waters as He spoke the world into existence (Gen I:2). Genesis 3:8 narrates that God walked with Adam in the garden. Scripture tells us that God dwelt among His creation. Then sin entered the world through the deception of the serpent and the great chasm between God and man became the new reality. But

God still longed to live among His people! He spoke to Moses through the burning bush (Ex 3:1-10). He guided the people out of exile through the wilderness by coming down from heaven in the form of a pillar of fire and a cloud (Ex 13:21). He instructed the people to build a sanctuary where He would dwell and meet with them.

Exodus 25:8-9 "Have the people build me a holy sanctuary so I can live among them. You must build the tabernacle and its furnishings exactly according to the pattern I will show you." (NLT)

The people offered up the finest of materials for the construction of the tabernacle: gold, silver, bronze, fine linen, acacia wood, onyx stones, gems, etc. Exodus 25-30 lists instructions and specifications in great detail about how the tabernacle was to be constructed. There are strict laws on who can enter the inner sanctuary (only priests) and the purification rituals that were required prior to entering (Lev 16:1-34).

Before Christ, where did God "dwell?" Was it permanent? Was it accessible? How did the people experience the Lord's presence? Who was allowed to be in His presence?

At just the right time, God incarnate in the person of Jesus stepped out of eternity and into time at a specific place in history, dwelt in a physical body, walked our earth, grew up in a family, learned a trade, made some friends, studied scripture, followed Jewish law, and participated in ministry. He truly dwelled among us. Then after His death, He returned to His heavenly dwelling with the Father, but gave us His spirit to take permanent residence in our hearts if we



so choose Him! But what does it mean for us right here and right now at this time in history that Christ, by His spirit, still "dwells among us?" John 14:15-20

John 14:23 "...Anyone who loves me will obey my teaching. My Father will love them, and we will come to them and make our home with them." (NIV)

What makes a house a home? What do you look for in a "dwelling place?" Safety, comfort, stability, longevity, good schools, accessibility to work, nice neighbors, good investment for the future, something that suits your style, big enough for your family but not too much maintenance or work, location, location, location... I don't think God thought of these things when He was seeking a dwelling place for His Son! Why would the King of Heaven want to step down into a cold, dirty, lowly, unsafe, unwelcoming, dwelling with neighbors who would not welcome him? (John 1:11) Neighbors that would reject Him, betray Him, and eventually put Him to death? Not for comfort, convenience, prestige, or accessibility! But for a future investment!

The "future investment" is the salvation of His children! (John 3:16) His ultimate dwelling would be in the willing hearts of men and women! One of the Bible definitions of "dwelling" refers to a "humble and lowly" existence. We as needy, selfish, sinful, and imperfect humans, are the temple to a perfect, holy God? We are most certainly humble and lowly! Wow. That Christ would CHOOSE to take up permanent residence in our humble and lowly earthly tent is overwhelming and hard to fathom, that He would choose us to be the temple of His Spirit seems ridiculous, and yet that is exactly why Jesus came!

1 Corinthians 3:16 "Don't you know that you yourselves are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in your midst?" (NIV)

How will you take care of your "temple" during this holiday season so as to honor the One who resides within you? (proper sleep, reduce stress by limiting commitments, eating healthy, getting outside, staying active, and being gentle with yourself when you need a break)

May we care for and honor the temple God has given us in which His Spirit dwells. May we seek to celebrate Christ's humble dwelling in our hearts. May we honor Him by removing our heart clutter and making room for Christ this season! May we seek to be a "proper host" for the King—in our earthly homes, and in our hearts.

Revelation 3:20 "Look! I stand at the door and knock! If you hear my voice and open the door, I will come in, and we will share a meal together as friends." (NLT)


These days it's not often you will get a knock at your door! And if you do, there's often a worry that it is an unwelcome salesperson or maybe it's the kid next door who always wants to sell you something you don't really want to buy. But when the knock on your door is from someone who simply wants to be with you, wants to spend time with you, and wants to share life with you, that is a welcomed knock! We will stop what we are doing and open the door. The Lord Jesus is always knocking, waiting patiently for us to open the door of our hearts, welcome Him in (mess and all!) and into our daily lives (mundane or eventful!).



Sometimes the Lord's knocking may be repeated "lessons" He is trying to teach you. Maybe it is through the words of a friend. Maybe it is the longing in your heart for His presence. Maybe it's through pain or overwhelming circumstances that finally wake you up to His knocking. This Advent season, how will you respond to His knocking? Ignore it? Drown it out with busyness? Avoid it? Put Him off until it's "convenient?" Or recognize it and respond with an open heart to meet with Him?

Sit quietly before the Lord. As you reflect on your life, are there instances or circumstances where Jesus was knocking on your door? How is He trying to get your attention lately?
Picture Jesus standing on your front doorstep quietly, yet persistently knocking. Be honest with yourself. What would your initial thoughts be? How would you feel? What would you do?

HEARTLOVE PLACE SERVICE PROJECT

Ask women to bring items to donate for Oakwood's Advent Conspiracy December Project!

Advent Conspiracy was founded on the radical idea that we can celebrate Christmas humbly and generously. Advent is the story of a wondrous moment when God entered our world to make things right. It is the greatest story ever told and it changes everything—including how we celebrate Christmas.

The key principles of this movement are:

- WORSHIP FULLY: Christmas begins and ends with Jesus
- SPEND LESS: Free up resources to support what matters
- **GIVE MORE:** Give more intentionally and relationally
- LOVE ALL: Radically love others like Jesus did

This year, Oakwood is supporting its Community Partners by gathering a generous volume of donations to bless one organization each month. The featured organization in December is HeartLove Place!

HeartLove Place is a nonprofit serving Milwaukee's Harambee Neighborhood. Founded on the principals of Christian values, HLP provides programs and services that empower, develop, and motivate families and strengthen our community.

HeartLove Place connects communities through Christ to empower individuals, motivate families, and build stronger neighborhoods. HeartLove Place is a nonprofit that was established in 1989, through the ministry of dedicated individuals who recognized the huge challenges facing Milwaukee's low-income population. Fractured families, unemployment, struggling schools, increasing crime, and teen pregnancy plagued our urban families and youth. To overcome these challenges, the leadership of HeartLove Place relied upon Christian principles and teaching to uplift individuals and communities within the Greater Milwaukee area.

Please consider one of these initiatives as a group service project:

- 1. BABY CLOSET: providing basic needs for newborns and babies (collect diapers size infant to pull-ups, wipes, etc.)
- 2. LOVE OFFERING: a monthly bag of essential grocery items which people pick up at their YMCA site, serving about 50 families a month (collect nutritious canned and boxed items, like canned soup, whole grain cereal, and healthy snacks for kids)
- 3. COATS FOR KIDS: partnering with WalMart, kids will be able to pick out a coat of their choice with coupons provided by donations (Coats range from \$30-50. Hostess could take a small offering, with no expectation to provide the total cost of a coat individually. They would like gloves and mittens as well.)

Hostesses, please deliver items to Oakwood Church at our Advent Conspiracy collection area, located in the upper level lobby, by December 27. 
